Perspectives By Rev. Matthew B. Smith

There is a story attributed to Bill Parcells, the famous NFL football coach.

He tells this story about two salesmen who were sent to Australia to sell shoes to the Aborigines. After arriving, one called back to his boss and said, "There are no



opportunities here; the natives don't wear shoes." But the other called back and said to his boss, "There are a lot of opportunities here. These people don't have any shoes!"

Recently, I have been introduced to the "Fresh Expressions" movement. It's about planting new communities of faith through contextual mission. In his book From the Steeple to the Street, Travis Collins makes a rather grim

New Discipleship Plan Coming!

As Methodists, discipleship is as essential to our mission as peanut butter is to jelly, or gravy to biscuits, or sugar to tea. Maybe that's just my own personal preference, but there are some things that just go good together. In his short book "Developing Discipleship Intentional System," Junius B. Dotson, General Secretary Discipleship Ministries, an

of the United agency Methodist Church, writes that, "We have a long tradition of intentional discipleship to draw upon. The early Methodists created class meetings, bands, and select societies (the early small group structure and opportunities for spiritual formation) as their system for introducing new disciples to the faith and helping them

to grow and mature. Within this system, disciples were encouraged to participate in small groups for Christian conferencing and practicing the means of grace." Dotson further postulates that the decline in the church is a result of not being intentional about discipleship. He says, "The problem is not a lack of people. The problem is our inability to see and reach them. We have forgotten why as disciples we are called to reach out in the first place." A discipleship plan is a great way to chart your growth in faith while having a road map to help get you where you need to go.

observation in the opening chapter titled, "If you're Discouraged, you're not alone." He writes, "More and more of your neighbors think less and less about your church. Some people in your community have dismissed the church because they were hurt, angered, or shamed by the church. It is just as likely, however, that people in your community are simply indifferent toward the church . . . People are so busy that they are going to invest their time only in activities they perceive to be of real benefit, and countless people simply perceive that the church offers no value to them."

When you look across the cultural landscape of today it's easy to see that the church does not play a prominent role in society. Like the story above, you can bemoan the lack of interest in the church, or you can see opportunity for new and fresh ways of being in mission to those around you with the timeless and unchangeable gospel of grace. Collins continues by saying, "The door has been opened for the Holy Spirit to blow through in a new way. If we understand ourselves to be in a missionary culture, and act accordingly, this is actually a time of great opportunity." May the Spirit of the living God inspire your hearts for fresh expressions of ministry here in our community.
